However, fashion always reflects what is going on in a society, and in the early 1900's it accurately reflected the metamorphosis of the American woman, tired of being a second-class citizen, tired of restrictive codes of dress and conduct. New inventions such as the bicycle and typewriter and new occupational opportunities in industry and business had given women a new sense of freedom and self-respect which demanded a less restrictive, less gender-driven code of dress. Shorter skirts (all the way to mid-calf), looser, less structured, less restrictive clothing, and, in some cases, even pants signaled that women were no longer defined by society's impractical rules. Following her hard-fought and successful campaign for suffrage, the American woman continues to this day to express her identity and point-of-view in the fashion she selects.

Fun Friday at Benjamin Harrison Historic Site

On September 8, 2017, the Benjamin Harrison Presidential Site, formerly the Benjamin Harrison House, was the destination for the Propylaeum's monthly Fun Friday. The group had beautiful fall weather as they walked to the Presidential Site, which is our neighbor and located just down the street at 1230 N. Delaware, Indianapolis IN 46202. Our group was assigned a docent, Mr. Don Saxon, for our tour.

Mr. Saxon started the tour with a visit to the first floor. These rooms included the formal living room, informal living room, study, kitchen and dining room. The dining room contains a cabinet with White House china. Caroline Scott Harrison, Benjamin's first wife,



started the White House China Collection and designed the first set of china. She was an artist, and her pictures are prevalent throughout the house. The second floor contains the master

Cathy Michel, Jill Chambers, and Nancy Roth bedroom su with a dressing room and the other bedrooms. Some of Mrs.

Caroline Harrison's dresses are displayed in these rooms. She was a small woman with a 17-inch waist. There are family photographs and pictures of the children growing up displayed on the walls. The tour ended on the third floor, which houses rotating exhibits, with the current one being an Exhibit of Presidential Pets. The home is beautifully maintained, and approximately 75%-80% of the furniture and decorative items are original.

According to the Benjamin Harris Presidential Site's web page, the Benjamin Harrison Site is a not for profit organization whose purpose is to maintain and preserve the Harrison home, collections and grounds as a museum and memorial to the only President of the United States elected from Indiana. Benjamin and Caroline Harrison built their home in 1874-75. The land was relatively expensive for the time and cost \$4,000. The cost of constructing the house was \$29,000. The President lived in this house until he died in 1901, and his family until 1913, except for the years that he was serving in the Senate and at the White House. In 1937, the home was sold to the Jordan Conservatory of Music with the understanding that the home and its artifacts would be forever preserved. In 1966, it was run as an historic site and opened to the public for tours, like the one the Prop members enjoyed.
